On Saturday, June 4th, we will be holding our first E-waste Recycling Event in the parking lot of the Olson & Company CPA building, **447 North First at Fox Ave.** Earth Care Recycling will be there **from 9 AM to 3 PM** to take your old computers, televisions, cell phones and more.

There is no charge for recycling your old electronics. But Earth Care will share a portion of its recycling proceeds with the VNA. So in addition to cleaning out your basement, you also help fund Vendome events, such as the annual Summer Barbecue. The more we recycle, the more money we get, so tell your friends in surrounding neighborhoods!

Our neighbors at Olson & Company CPA have generously allowed us to use their parking lot for this event. Out of courtesy to them, **please do not leave any items at this location outside of the event hours.**

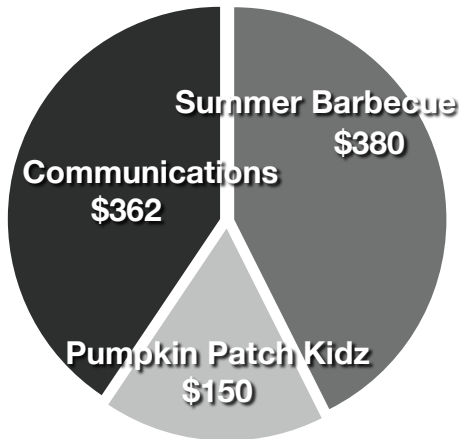

The Vendome Neighborhood Association is an all-volunteer organization, which is funded through donations from Vendome residents. All VNA events and activities are made possible by the generosity of your neighbors.

Vendome 2011 Budget



The VNA does not have a large budget: in 2010, our total spending was under \$1350. About 65% of this was spent on our events, the Summer Barbecue and Pumpkin Patch Kidz. Another 30% was spent for communications — printing of fliers and the *Vendome Voice*, web hosting for *vendome.org* and our Post Office box.

The VNA Board of Directors strives to manage our limited finances responsibly and transparently. Every quarter, the Treasurer prepares a financial report for the Board, and these are always posted on *vendome.org* for all to see. In addition, this past January, the Board decided to prepare a formal Association Budget for 2011.

You can find the detailed budget on *vendome.org*, but the short version is that we've budgeted \$892 in expenditures for the year — including \$380 for the Summer Barbecue, and \$150 for Pumpkin

Patch Kidz. We also decided to pare back our communications expenses as much as possible — see page 4 for some changes to our meeting announcements.

Of course, the other side of expenditures is income. We are trying some new things this year, such as the E-waste Recycling Event (see page 1). But as ever, we rely on the generosity of our neighbors for the bulk of our budget. The VNA is not a 501(c)3 organization, so your donation is not tax-deductible, but it is still greatly appreciated.

The Vendome Neighborhood Association holds a general meeting, open to all in the neighborhood, once each quarter. In the past, we've pre-announced exact dates for these meetings at the start of each year, but we've sometimes had to change them, because our hosts at California Bank & Trust can't commit to availability a year in the future.

Art Box Project SJ

Gary Singh, a columnist for *Metro Newspapers*, took pictures of decorated utility boxes in other cities, and wondered about bringing a similar aesthetic to San Jose. The Vendome's own Tina Morrill wants to make this idea a reality, and has created **Art Box Project SJ**.

The goal of this project is to integrate art into San Jose neighborhoods like the Vendome, and as Tina says, "to capture the unique voices of our community."

Art Box Project SJ is in the planning stages and could be launched by the Fall of 2011. Like the SharkByte Art project of 2001, the Art Box project expects to have local artists submit proposals and seek sponsorships from local businesses, civic groups, neighborhood associations, and so forth. The Department of Transportation will review project locations and proposals to ensure public safety.

Palo Alto, Hayward, and Scotts Valley have similar projects in progress. According to the *Contra Costa Times*, art on utility boxes in Hayward has reduced graffiti on the boxes by 97%.
